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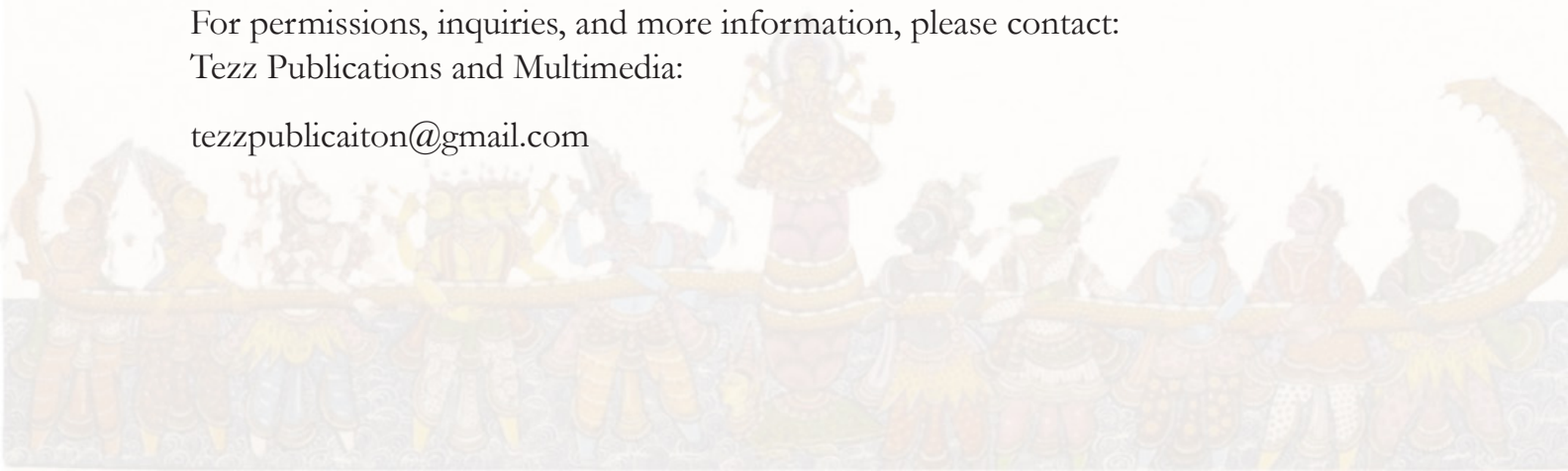
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PREFACE

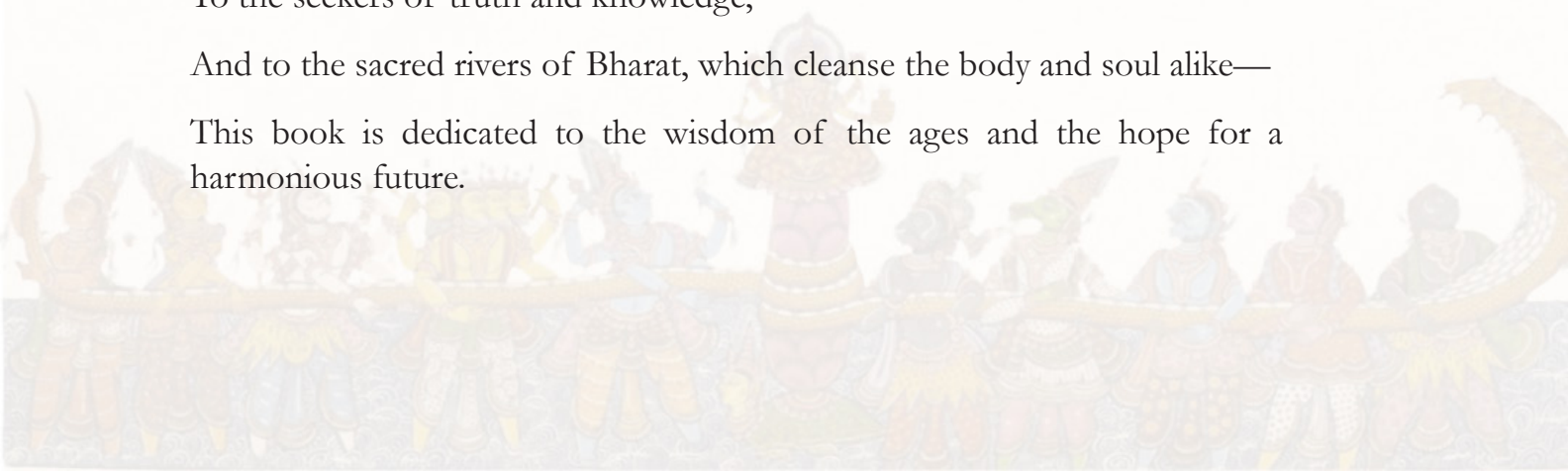

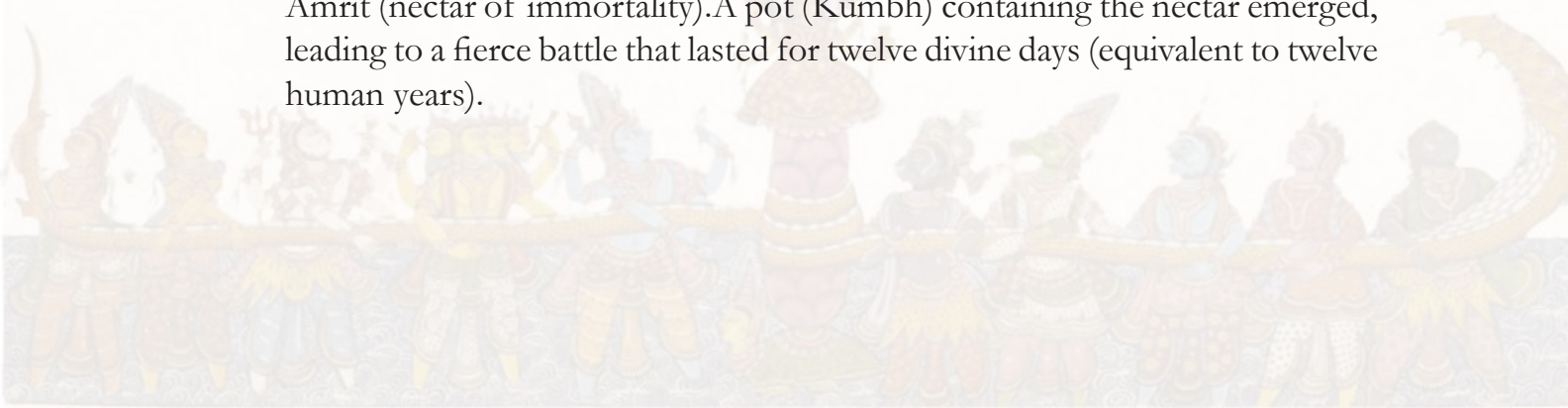
MAHAKUMBH 2025

The Kumbh Mela's timing is determined by precise astronomical calculations, linking it to planetary movements and celestial alignments.

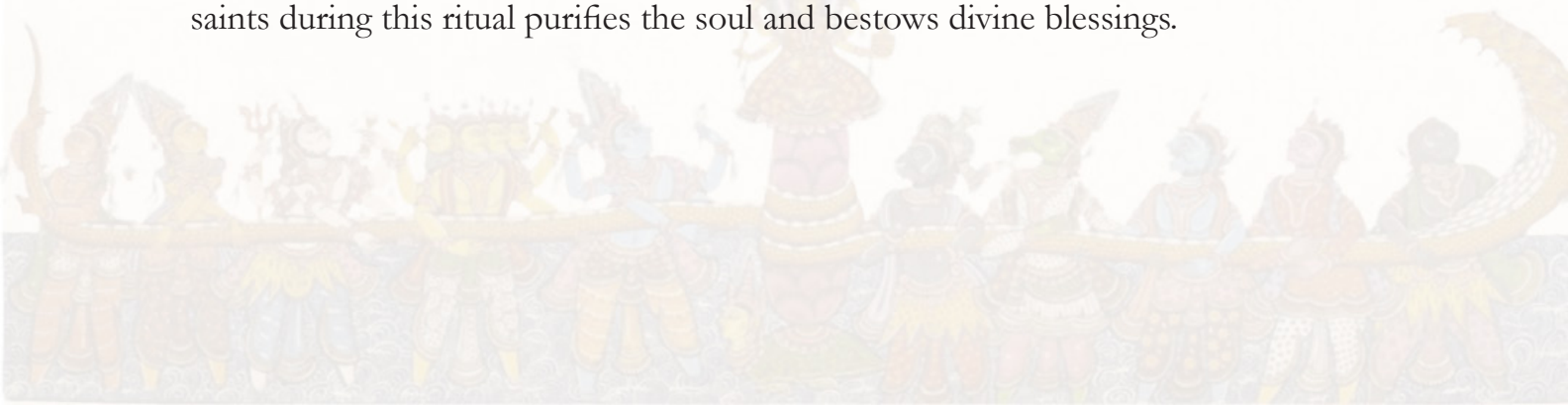
